#### Interim Disadvantaged Community Programming Guidelines

Safe, Clean Water Program Implementing Disadvantaged Community Policies in the Regional Program



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#### <u>Purpose</u>

Experience to-date in the Regional Program reveals that aspects of Safe, Clean Water Program (SCWP) related to providing Disadvantaged Community Benefits require further guidance to better support achieving the outcomes sought. The SCWP emphasizes investments that produce benefits in or directly to disadvantaged communities. Complying with the Disadvantaged Community Benefit policy in the Program is complex, and asserting what benefits accrue to which communities is not easily quantified.

As of May 2021, the District Program is developing a study which, among many things, will review how other funding programs that direct investment in disadvantaged communities have worked to overcome the many challenges that remain when seeking to implement the SCWP policy. That study will inform future guidance, currently expected in the Spring of 2022, in support of Stormwater Investment Plan (SIP) development in the Regional Program for Year 4 (2022-23).

### **Program Definitions**

"'Disadvantaged community' means a census block group that has an annual median household income of less than eighty percent (80%) of the Statewide annual median household income (as defined in Water Code section 79505.5)." (Section 16.03(H))



Example of a Census Block Group in the LSGR

"'**Disadvantaged Community (DAC) Benefit**' means a Water Quality Benefit, Water Supply Benefit, and/or Community Investment Benefit located in a DAC or providing benefits directly to a DAC population." (Section 16.03(I))



### SCWP Disadvantaged Community Benefit Policy

Provide Disadvantaged Community Benefits that are ≥110% of the ratio of the disadvantaged community population to the total population in the Watershed Area. (Section 18.04 (J))

#### All Projects to Date

DISADVANTAGED COMMUNITY (DAC) ALLOCATION

Required DAC Ratio	30%
Required Funding for DACs FY23-28 (110%)	\$16,062,285
Funding Allocated for DACs FY23-28	\$26,043,271

To date, the SSMB SIPs have met and exceeded required investment in disadvantaged communities.

Projects provide a Disadvantaged Community Benefit if:

1. Any of the construction effort is <u>within</u> a census block group designated as a disadvantaged community

OR

 None of the construction effort is within a census block group designated as a disadvantaged community BUT it provides a "direct benefit" to a census block group designated as a disadvantaged community.

### What Counts as a "Direct Benefit?"

Whether a Project provides a "direct benefit" will be a decision made by WASCs on a project-byproject basis, considering:

- the goals of the SCWP,
- the benefits provided to the community by each Project, and
- the area within which those benefits will be felt.

### How Can you as a WASC Validate Direct Benefits?

Hearing from community members is the best way to validate a direct benefit.



## Submitted Round 5 Projects NOT Located Within and ARE Claiming Benefits to a 2020 Disadvantaged Census Block Group

**Suggested Action:** Up to the WASC's discretion to validate whether these projects would provide direct benefit to disadvantaged communities if implemented.

According to the 2020 census data provided on the digital spatial library, 0.3 miles away from the closest DAC.


#### **Project Benefits**

#### Water Quality Improvement


- Removes trash, PCBs and DDT, metals, bacteria
- Reduces Total Nitrogen by 96% (544lbs) and Total Phosphorus by 92.6% (150lbs) annually
- Diverts 85<sup>th</sup>%, 24-hr runoff volume from PVP targeted drainage area (2,281 acres)

#### **Community Investment Benefits**

- Direct water quality benefits to DAC and SDAC
- Improves flood management
- Reduces local heat island effect
- Increases carbon sequestration
- Improves air quality

# WASC to validate direct benefit to a disadvantaged community.

#### **Moving Forward**

As a WASC, you are tasked with validating whether a Project provides a "direct benefit" to a disadvantaged community. Done on a project-by-project basis.

Take into consideration:

- What you have heard from the community themselves?
- What benefits is the project providing and how are these quantified?
- What areas will experience those benefits?
- Do the project benefits meet community-identified priorities and concerns?
- What other project-specific considerations should be taken into account? (E.g. community access to a site)


