## **Comments**

Wildfire runoff has impacted Santa Monica Bay, with contaminants like heavy metals, PAHs, nutrients, and bacteria. Heal the Bay's review of LA County data from January 2025 shows elevated pollutants, declining water clarity, and potential public health risks, especially at Will Rogers State Beach and Topanga Beach. Our findings so far are summarized below, and we will continue to provide updates on our website (https://healthebay.org) as new data become available.

## Key Findings:

- Heavy Metals: Exceeded marine health safety limits, posing risks to marine life and bioaccumulation.
- PAHs: Exceeded monthly average human health limits, posing a potential risk to human health, if elevated concentrations persist.
- Nutrients & Turbidity: Increased phosphorus led to brown foam; reduced clarity indicates potential for widespread contamination.
- Bacteria: High levels near storm drains, worsening after rain.

Recommendation: Avoid ocean water from Las Flores to Santa Monica State Beach and exercise caution south to Dockweiler. Heal the Bay continues testing and urges transparency from public health officials.

If the Central Santa Monica Bay WASC would be interested in a presentation on Heal the Bay's post-fire surface water quality and sand sampling, we would be happy to provide that at a future WASC Meeting.
