



Identify and Develop Project Concepts

- Looked at possible project sites in Topanga with Craig Doberstein and his colleague, geomorphologist Jeff Parsons
- SAMO Fund applied for Medea Creek project to SCWP Community Engagement and Education Grant (CEE Grant); \$250K
- Austin Toyoma (SMMUSD,) Claire Robinson (Amigo de los Rios); may apply for Webster School in Malibu, SCWP CEE Grant; \$250K
- Nascent Lake Lindero project idea is defunct due to new lawsuits.
- -Asking RCDSMM to update of the Topanga
 Creek Watershed Plan



- RCDSMM submitted watershed education grant to SCWP Community Engagement and Education Grant; \$250K
- Asked ARLA to consider connecting cisterns to water supply for fire; suggested LAT op ed piece
- SAMO Fund applying for to SCWP Community
 Engagement and Education Grant; probably just under \$200K

- Attended NSMB FY25-26 SIP Budget Outlook led by Eric Bonilla with Jessica Forte and Roxanne Hughes







Defensible Space First Five Feet! The first 5 feet of your home plays a pivotal role in its protection BRINGING WATER · Avoid storage. Compost bins, toy boxes, coat and shoe cupboards, and recycle and trash cans should be placed outside of this area. Absolutely no flammable plants. The most flammable include buckwheat, cypress, eucalyptus, juniper, and any other plant with a · Absolutely no woody dry organic mulches, Inorganic mulches, like river rock, are preferred. If organic mulch is needed, then use only humus, the most decomposed. · Avoid the use of fabrics, which includes awnings, cushions and Avoid erecting shading devices with the first 5 feet. Not only will this help stop a fire from connecting to a structure, but it also gives the wind and firebrands an easy exit, instead of trapping them,
