Quarter 2 - November 2025

Leveraged funding is a key program goal in the Safe, Clean Water (SCW) Program Implementation Ordinance (Chapter 18.04). Watershed Coordinators play a supporting role in "identify[ing] potential partners and additional sources of funding to augment and leverage SCW Program revenues" for Safe, Clean Water Regional Program projects (Chapter 18.07). This funding report provides a landscape overview of recent funding policy highlights and shares currently active and upcoming funding opportunities that may be relevant to Safe, Clean Water Program infrastructure projects.

POLICY HIGHLIGHTS

State Highlights

The California Climate Bond lays out \$10 billion to enhance the state's climate resilience. Under the California Fiscal Year (2025-26) Budget, \$3.3 billion has been appropriated, \$1.2 billion of which has been allocated for water quality projects or programs.

Bond funds will be used for state-managed projects, local assistance grant programs, and <u>approximately 119 directed programs</u>. The California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) has compiled an <u>Implementation Guide</u> for state agencies administering local assistance grants to satisfy bond requirements and recommend best practices.

These programs are currently preparing guidelines to help address bond language that "at least 40 percent of the total funds available...shall be allocated for projects that provide meaningful and direct benefits to vulnerable populations or disadvantaged communities" and "at least 10 percent of the total funds...shall be allocated for projects that provide meaningful and direct benefits to severely disadvantaged communities" (California Climate Bond, Section 90140). Members of the public are encouraged to provide public comment as draft guidelines are released. Final solicitations will be posted on the California Grants Portal when available.

Federal Highlights

As of November 6, 2025, the federal government has been shut down since October 1, 2025. The lapse in appropriations has impacted federal government staffing and capacity and state programs that receive federal funding. The last government shutdown occurred in December 2018 to January 2019, lasting about four weeks. The non-partisan Congressional Budget Office reported that the 2019 shutdown resulted in reduced economic activity, and many government agencies stalled grant awards and disbursements due to lack of funding. Information on services funded by the federal government, such as the Federal Grants Portal, may also be out-of-date or delayed. As indicated on the Federal Grants Portal, the website system "will accept and store applications until such time as the responsible agency has the authority and funding to return to normal business operations."

ACTIVE & UPCOMING FUNDING OPPORTUNITES

The programs highlighted below are funding opportunities that may be the most relevant to Safe, Clean Water Program projects. As of November 6, 2025, these programs are currently open and accepting applications or are forecasted to open. See the attached funding matrix for a more extensive list of relevant funding opportunities.

California Department of Transportation's Sustainable Communities Grant funds local and regional multimodal transportation and land use planning projects that further the region's Regional Transportation Sustainable Communities Strategy (RTP SCS) or Alternative Planning Strategy (APS) where applicable, to contribute to the State's greenhouse gas reduction targets, and assist in achieving the California Department of Transportation's (Caltrans) mission and Grant Program objectives. Applications are due November 21, 2025. Projects must have a transportation nexus and can connect to aspects such as implementation projects for active transportation, climate change, corridor and freight, social equity,

integrated housing, land use, and transportation, multimodal, safety, and transit. Eligible primary applicants must have statutory authority to conduct transportation/transit planning for their jurisdiction (e.g., metropolitan planning organizations with sub-applicants, regional transportation planning agencies, transit agencies, cities and counties with compliant housing elements and completed annual progress reports, Native American Tribal governments, and other public transportation planning entities).

The grant minimum is \$500,000 for under-resourced communities and \$100,000 for all other communities. The grant maximum is \$700,000 for all communities. A local cost-share requirement of at least 11.7% is required and is waived for Native American Tribal Governments.

California Coastal Commission's WHALE TAIL® Grant funds education and engagement projects to help people connect to the California coast and its watersheds through experiential education, stewardship, and outdoor experiences. WHALE TAIL® Grants focus on reaching communities that have historically received fewer marine education and stewardship opportunities, and strive for a broad geographic distribution throughout California. Applications are due **December 15, 2025.** Projects must engage communities in California and include education about coastal and marine environments. This may include classroom-based programs, field trips, climate change education and stewardship, coastal habitat restoration or shoreline cleanup programs with community involvement, community or participatory science, cultural and ancestral practice preservation, workforce development, and much more. Projects must begin between May 15 and October 1, 2026.

The Coastal Commission strongly encourages projects engaging communities that face barriers accessing coastal and marine education and stewardship. The Coastal Commission is looking for applicant organizations based in, and composed of, the communities they are engaging. Eligible applicants include individuals, non-profit organizations, public agencies, and Tribal Governments.

California Department of Toxic Substances Control's Brownfields Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Grant Program provides grants for two types of brownfield sites: hazardous substance release sites and petroleum sites. Grantees may also use funds for pre-cleanup site assessments and for environmental cleanup. Eligible applicants include local governments, Tribal entities, and nonprofits, and developers not liable under Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) Section 107. The program has an ongoing, rolling application period. More information can be found by scheduling a meeting with the Program Manager to discuss eligibility.

San Gabriel and Lower Los Angeles Rivers & Mountains Conservancy Consolidated Grant Program includes a single grant application for multiple funding sources, including non-bond priorities grant programs and Proposition 1, 68, and 4 funds. A full listing of funding sources and amounts is published on the Local Assistance and Support Budget report on the RMC Board Meetings page of the website, updated at each meeting. Applicants do not need to specify which funding source they are applying to. Once an application is submitted, RMC staff will determine the most appropriate funding source(s) based on project's alignment with funding sources and duration of the project. This program has an ongoing, rolling application period.

Eligible applicants include State and Federal agencies, Tribal entities recognized by the US Federal Register or as a California Native American tribe, local public agencies (including water districts and school districts), local conservation corps, nonprofit organizations, and Joint Powers Authorities. Eligible projects including planning, implementation, acquisition, and technical assistance.

<u>Caltrans' Stormwater Treatment Partnership Programs</u> provide funding to stormwater projects that improve regional water quality and facilitate partnerships with municipalities to achieve compliance with Caltrans' National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit. There are two partnership programs, the Cooperative Implementation Agreements (CIA) Program and the Financial Contribution Only (FCO) Program. Both programs are **ongoing**, and annual funds are determined in March of each fiscal year based on Caltrans' Stormwater operating expenses. Projects that are not awarded funding in the

current round remain eligible for funding in future rounds. For more information, please contact Los Angeles County Caltrans Stormwater Coordinator Anand Maganti.

California Wildlife Conservation Board General Grants funds planning, implementation, acquisition, technical assistance, and scientific study projects that provide one or more of the following benefits: 1) Protect or enhance biodiversity; 2) Climate change resiliency and connectivity; 3) Support State Wildlife Action Plan priority habitats; 4) Conserve or enhance working landscapes; 5) Conserve or enhance water-related projects; and 6) Enhance public access. The application cycle is continuous, and it is recommended that applicants first consult Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB) staff prior to completing a Pre-Application. Award amounts vary based on current available funds and the application pool. Funding amounts are determined by the WCB voting board and grants manager. There is no cost-share requirement.

California State Water Resources Control Board's Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) offers low-cost financing for a wide variety of wastewater and water quality projects, including funding for water reuse and stormwater projects. Financing is offered through low-interest loans at half the general obligation bond rate. Stormwater mitigation projects are also eligible for loan forgiveness. California's CWSRF receives annual funds from principal and interest on past loans, federal allocations, periodic allocations to the State Water Board from the California annual budget, and other funds approved by California voters such as Propositions 1, 68, and 4. The California CWSRF offers an average of \$940 million in financing annually. Section 91011 of Proposition 4 allocated \$610 million in grants or loans that improve water quality or help provide clean, safe, and reliable drinking water.

Applications are accepted on a **rolling basis and are reviewed at the end of the calendar year**. Projects in small (defined as less than 20,000 people) and/or disadvantaged communities are prioritized for grant funding and principal loan forgiveness. Specific funding percentages and caps change by the year but are developed annually through a stakeholder-driven process and released in that year's Intended Use Plan. Some public entities are unable to apply for the CWSRF financing due to conflicting requirements with existing debt.

Round 7 Infrastructure Program Projects Funding Assessments

Funding Assessments are being prepared by the Regional Coordination Team for all Round 7 (FY 26-27) SCW Regional Program Infrastructure Program projects the Scoring Committee confirms are eligible. Funding Assessments will be transmitted to the Watershed Area Steering Committee (WASC) alongside the Scoring Committee's review of projects to be used as a resource as WASCs develop their Stormwater Investment Plans. Funding Assessments will be posted on the Safe, Clean Water Program website under the respective WASC page.

Funding programs change frequently. The identified funding opportunities compiled are a list of potentially relevant opportunities, updated as of November 6, 2025. Further research should verify project-specific eligibility requirements, latest funding levels, and appropriate timelines. Use the links attached to research these programs further. If you are unsure about your project eligibility or competitiveness, reaching out to program coordinators via contact emails or webinars is a good way to get your questions answered. Safe, Clean Water Program Watershed Coordinators can also support leveraged funding efforts. The Federal Grants Portal, California Grants Portal and CFCC Funding Fairs can serve as additional resources to identify funding opportunities.
