1) Welcome and Introductions

Chair Susie Santilena welcomed Committee Members and called the meeting to order. Los Angeles County Public Works (Public Works) staff facilitated the roll call of Committee Members. A quorum was established.

2) Approval of Meeting Minutes from March 3, 2026

Member Conor Mossavi motioned to approve the meeting minutes from March 3, 2026. Member Darryl Ford seconded the motion. The Committee voted to approve the March 3, 2026 minutes with 14 votes in favor, 1 vote in abstention, and no votes in opposition (approved, see vote tracking sheet attached).

3) Committee Member & Program Updates

Member Bruce Reznik shared about being appointed to the Regional Oversight Committee (ROC), filling the seat vacated by Mark Gold. As part of this transition, Member Reznik will step down from the Central Santa Monica Bay (CSMB) Watershed Area Steering Committee (WASC) once an appropriate replacement has been identified and onboarded.

Public Works shared Regional Program updates, noting:

- As the Committee discusses Infrastructure Program (IP) Projects, Project Concepts, Scientific Studies, and Project Modification Requests (PMRs) for the Stormwater Investment Plan (SIP), it is important for the WASC and the work of the Regional Program to remain transparent and fair. These principles are built into the Safe, Clean Water (SCW) Program and are represented by the *ex parte* disclosures on each agenda. WASC Members whose job connects them to specific applications should ask colleagues or consultants to attend WASC meetings to share about or advocate for those projects and should avoid using their position as WASC Members to advocate for project applications from their home entities.

4) Watershed Coordinator Updates

Watershed Coordinators Stephanie Gebhardt Rath and Vanessa Boudreau provided updates. Presentation slides are available on the SCW Program [website](#).

Key highlights included ongoing outreach efforts focused on post-fire recovery and building a more resilient Los Angeles. Engagement activities included meetings with the Paseo Miramar Homeowners' Association (HOA) and Resilient Palisades, as well as coordination with City staff and multiple Council District offices. In February, the Watershed Coordinators conducted a funding workshop with the Venice Canals Association. In March, the Watershed Coordinators focused on identifying cost-share opportunities. The Watershed Coordinators coordinated with the Hollywood Bowl Technical Resources Program Project (TRP), canvassed in the Crenshaw neighborhood, and participated in the Walking Water Pilgrimage, which brought together tribal representatives and community-based organizations to discuss the connection between the Owens Valley and Los Angeles' water system. During the Walking Water Pilgrimage, community groups highlighted challenges in accessing and engaging with the SCW Program, including concerns about limited resources and difficulty realizing anticipated community benefits. There was also a strong emphasis on the importance of park-based and recreational projects as a consistent community priority.

Member Mossavi asked for additional general feedback from the Watershed Coordinators. The Watershed Coordinators noted that limited resources remain a key constraint and contribute to ongoing challenges in SCW Program implementation. The Watershed Coordinators also emphasized that projects which enhance community interaction, particularly park and recreation-based improvements, continue to be a consistent priority and desired benefit among community members.

Watershed Coordinator Boudreau shared a comparative document outlining potential projects and studies for inclusion in the SIP, noting that the information was based on publicly available application data and did not include funding reductions.

5) Ex Parte Communication Disclosure

Member Reznik noted brief conversations regarding the PMR and potential cost share for the Slauson Connect Project, and disclosed involvement through an affiliated partner organization on the Campus-Community Connection: UCLA's Mobility, Stormwater Capture, and Greening Project (Campus-Community Connection Project), including helping to identify matching funds. Member Geremew Amenu shared that the County is a partner on two projects under consideration, one led by the City of Los Angeles and another by Inglewood, and disclosed participation in related discussions. Member Augustine Han noted involvement through his organization providing a letter of support for the Campus-Community Connection Project. Chair Santilena also reported a brief email exchange with Project partners regarding a proposed reduction in cost-share requests for the Ballona Creek TMDL Operations and Maintenance Project (Ballona Creek TMDL Project).

6) Public Comment Period

13 public comment cards were submitted to Public Works prior to 5:00pm the day before the meetings. Comment cards are available on the [SCW Program website](#).

Deborah Gregory (Ballona Creek Renaissance) expressed support for the Culver Median Del Rey Way TRP, noting community support from outreach events.

Patricia Bijvoet (Urban Planning and Landscape Architecture (UPLA) Studio) expressed support for the Culver Median Del Rey Way TRP. Bijvoet described the TRP as a significant opportunity for the community, noting frequent use of the Culver Boulevard path and identifying potential improvements to the median. Bijvoet emphasized opportunities to enhance the space through increased tree canopy, improved aesthetics, and the integration of stormwater filtration benefits within the median.

Stephanie Reed (UPLA Studio) expressed support for the proposed Culver Median Del Rey Way TRP. Reed, whose daycare provider lives near the Culver median, shared observations of conditions of disrepair during COVID-19, including increased encampments, and expressed support for the proposed improvements.

Kristen Torres Pawling, representing Los Angeles City Councilmember Katy Yaroslavsky, expressed support for the Campus-Community Connection Project, noting that the daytime population in the area is approximately 84,000 and highlighting the Project's potential to inspire broad community benefit.

Mikaela Randolph (Natural History Museums of Los Angeles County (NHMLAC) Board of Governors) expressed support for the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits - An Investment in Community, Green Space & Water Quality Enhancement Project (Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project). Randolph commented that the Project would address a critical need for green space in urban areas and enhance Hancock Park for both residents and visitors, noting also the anticipated Community Benefits for Disadvantaged Communities through educational field trips and support from community partners and school districts.

Wally Marks (NHMLAC Board of Governors) expressed strong support for the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project, noting long-standing involvement since its inception. Marks emphasized the cultural and ecological importance of the site, its value for public education on regional flora and fauna, and its potential to attract thousands of additional visitors. Marks described the Project as shovel-ready and unique in its scope and educational value.

Mike Scaduto (City of Los Angeles) provided comments on the Ballona Creek TMDL Project. Scaduto noted anticipated operational readiness by the end of the year and requested support for the operations and maintenance component. Scaduto also referenced the Slauson Connect Clean Water Project (Slauson Connect Project) PMR, which has broken ground and will provide investment in a historically Disadvantaged Community. Scaduto expressed support for the proposed scope and schedule changes and noted that the County maintains stringent cost conditions.

7) Presentations and Discussion Items

a) Central Santa Monica Bay (CSMB) Project Prioritization and Selection Discussion for Populating the Fiscal Year 2026-27 Stormwater Investment Plan (SIP)

Public Works provided an overview of the Fiscal Year (FY) 2026–2027 (26-27) scenarios and how they impact the SIP for FY26–27, noting the Regional Oversight Committee (ROC) guidance that future FYs not exceed 80% allocation, although the WASC is at liberty to allocate more than 80% of the budget for the current FY. Upon inquiry by Member Josette Descalzo, staff clarified that carryover funds are reflected in the financial tables and that the WASC cannot recommend a SIP that exceeds the collected revenue. Staff noted that several project applicants and continuing project developers had reduced or redistributed their funding requests to allow for more flexibility within the SIP. Public Works staff reviewed the initial project

ranking results for the 13 newly submitted PMRs, noting that survey feedback used in the evaluation was collected in February 2026.

The WASC began deliberations with a focus on the PMR. Member Mossavi suggested starting with whether to remove or approve modifications to the Slauson Connect Project. Upon inquiry by Member Amenu, staff noted that while the Project proposed no funding reduction, the Project had shifted its funding request across fiscal years. Mike Antos (Stantec, Regional Coordination) reminded the Committee that a potential course of action to approve the modifications proposed in the Slauson Connect Project's PMR, even if the WASC cannot provide the additional funding that the Project requested.

David Washington (Corvias Infrastructure Solutions) representing the Slauson Connect Project developer explained that the applicant team is exploring further scope reductions but would need additional time to do so. Washington emphasized the Project's importance to the community and the ongoing efforts to balance scope with funding constraints. Antos commented that it might work in the applicant's favor to avoid having a rejected PMR, suggesting that the project developer consider withdrawing the PMR in order to have more time for the project developer team to consider other solutions. The project developer elected to withdraw the PMR. Chair Susie Santilena requested clarification on next steps. Public Works staff confirmed that the project developer would submit written confirmation of withdrawal by email and could submit another PMR in the future.

The WASC then shifted to broader SIP considerations. Member Reznik framed the discussion around maximizing the number of projects funded, noting community feedback that the SCW Program tends to prioritize large-scale projects while lacking representation of tribal and smaller community-based efforts. Member Reznik requested a scenario in the SIP Tool including the Edward Vincent Project, the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project, the Ballona Creek TMDL Operations and Maintenance Project, the Campus-Community Connection Project, Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project, San Vicente Streetscape Plaza Project, and the Culver Median Del Rey Way TRP. Member Perez expressed concern that while FY 2026–27 allocations appear below 60% in this scenario, it would land FY 2027–28 allocations close to 96%.

Member Mossavi acknowledged applicants' efforts to reduce funding but noted variability in reductions and suggested further scope modifications or potential removal of projects, namely the San Vicente Streetscape Plaza Project and the Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project. Merryl Taylor (Craftwater) provided clarification on the San Vicente Streetscape Plaza Project, explaining its phased approach to capturing both wet and dry weather flows, with certain components treated separately. Taylor also clarified that the aspects of the Project that would deal with local runoff are the components that would be funded by the SCW Program. Javier de la Cruz (Culver City), representing the Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project, noted the Project has secured \$11 million in leveraged funding from Caltrans. Upon inquiry, Member Sean Singletary clarified that wet weather capture proportions are estimated at approximately 7–8%.

Member Amenu and Member Han expressed concern regarding tight allocations limiting flexibility for future applicants and PMRs, particularly in the context of rising construction costs. Member Daniel Bradbury and Member Mossavi discussed ROC thresholds. Member Mossavi recommended a more conservative approach.

Member Reznik inquired about a potential for increased leveraged funding for the Ballona Creek TMDL Operations and Maintenance Project. Scaduto, representing the Ballona Creek TMDL Operations and Maintenance Project, clarified that the funding request has been reduced as far as the City of Los Angeles is comfortable, and includes cost share for the first year.

Member Han proposed including all design projects, TRPs, and Scientific Studies (SS) as a baseline approach, while acknowledging concerns about potential redundancy in Scientific Studies. Member Amenu expressed a desire to include a number of projects within each phase.

Chair Santilena guided the Committee toward scenario development, proposing adjustments to the Edward Vincent Project by redistributing funding from FY 27–28 to later years to alleviate near-term allocation pressure. Brenda Ponton (Woodard & Curran representing project applicant) noted that extending funding timelines would increase financing costs. Member Bradbury supported delaying funding to later years and proposed a scenario including all IPs, SS, and the TRP except for the Edward Vincent Project. Member Reznik noted that the Project received a high Multi-Benefit Score and has a high cost share.

Member Amenu suggested that the Edward Vincent Project is the only fully Disadvantaged Community project in the portfolio. Member Zoe Cunliffe raised concerns about how the program defines Disadvantaged Community Benefits and cautioned against funding all projects without stronger prioritization, noting that some projects could proceed without WASC funding. Chair Santilena reiterated the importance of including multi-benefit projects and proposed a scenario that funded most projects except the West LA College Stormwater Improvements Project, while redistributing funding for the Edward Vincent Project across fiscal years. Chair Santilena emphasized the need for collaboration with the City of Inglewood. Tony Olmos from Inglewood Public Works expressed willingness to adjust funding timing but highlighted the risk of escalating construction costs with delays.

Watershed Coordinator Stephanie Gebhardt Rath noted opportunities to identify additional leveraged funding through Infrastructure Project assessments.

Member Mossavi expressed concerns about project eligibility and redundancy. Member Mossavi noted that historically, projects not capturing offsite flows have not been supported by this WASC, suggesting further discussion of inclusion of the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project. He also expressed concern that the Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project and San Vicente Streetscape Plaza Project may overlap significantly with existing infrastructure, particularly with the Ballona Creek TMDL Project, and recommended changes in scope. Public Works clarified that project scopes cannot be modified during the current SIP process; applicants would need to return in a future SIP cycle to make such substantial changes. Member Mossavi expressed opposition to supporting the two design projects under their current scopes. Member Reznik advocated for evaluating projects holistically, supporting inclusion of the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project, and supported advancing design funding to allow further refinement. Member Sean Singletary clarified the redundancy issue for Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project, noting that the project targets both dry and wet weather flows, whereas the Ballona Creek TMDL Project only captures dry weather flows.

Members Ford and Perez expressed support for the scenario displayed on screen, which excluded the West LA College Stormwater Improvements Project and Memorial Park Multi-Benefit Stormwater Capture Project. Member Descalzo advocated for including the Syd Kronenthal Park Stormwater Capture Project and the San Vicente Streetscape Plaza Project, noting that the two projects only account for about 4% of the funding budget. Member Bradbury and Member Han supported including the design-phase IP projects.

Member Cunliffe supported including the Scientific Studies in the SIP, particularly the A Holistic Assessment of Trash in Watersheds Study and Regional CECs and Pollutant EMCs in Stormwater Assessment Study. Member Han referenced recent EPA actions on microplastics and pharmaceuticals in encouragement for proactive study. Member Mossavi acknowledged the potential future value of projects but encouraged caution. Member Amenu expressed concern that the A Holistic Assessment of Trash in Watersheds Study lacked practical application based on prior discussions.

Chair Santilena raised concerns about high allocation levels in upcoming years (89% in FY27-28 and 88% in FY28-29) and sought feedback on whether to reduce them further. Member Reznik suggested backloading funding for the Edward Vincent Project, leading to a further funding redistribution with lower allocation levels (81% in FY27-28 and FY 28-29). He also emphasized the need for a more strategic approach to Scientific Studies in future cycles.

8) Public Comment Period

Dr. Sanjay Mohanty (UCLA) emphasized that the proposed Regional CECs and Pollutant EMCs in Stormwater Assessment Study is forward-looking and addresses emerging contaminants such as microplastics. Mohanty noted that Scientific Studies have relatively low costs but provide significant long-term benefits and support informed decision-making.

Tonantzin Carmelo (NHMLAC's Native American Advisory Committee) expressed support for the Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits Project, citing collaboration on incorporating Tongva cultural narratives into the renovated museum and park. Carmelo highlighted climate-adapted California native plantings, biodiversity benefits, drought tolerance, and educational opportunities for visitors through nature-based, climate-resilient design. Carmelo encouraged the CSMB WASC to support the Project.

9) Voting Items

- a) **Approve the final Fiscal Year 2026-27 Stormwater Investment Plan funding recommendation for the CSMB Watershed Area, including Watershed Coordinator, and approve submission to the Regional Oversight Committee for review**

Member Han motioned to approve the Final Fiscal Year 2026–2027 Stormwater Investment Plan for the CSMB Watershed Area, including Watershed Coordinators, and approve submission to the ROC for review, pending submittal of the Funding Reduction Concurrence Form from the applicants (funding scenario: “All continuing projects and scientific studies (with funding changes); 7 new Infrastructure Projects (Campus - Community Connection, Reimagining La Brea Tar Pits, Edward Vincent Jr. Park, Memorial Park, Ballona Creek TMDL, Syd Kronenthal Park, San Vicente); 3 New Studies (A Holistic Assessment of Trash, Stormwater BMP O&M Needs Assessment, Regional CEC’s and Pollutants EMCs); New TRP (Culver Median Del Rey Way)”). Member Reznik seconded the motion. The motion was approved with 12 in favor, 1 abstention, and 2 opposed (approved, see vote tracking sheet).
